I cannot believe the year is over already. As we round out the month of May we look at a theme of recognition. Recognition of all that has been done, those who have touched our lives and actions we will continue once Summer is upon us.

First let's look at what has been done in 2023-2024. For Recycling Services,



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it was a year of exploration. Through a grant from the Iowa DNR, various posters were posted throughout campus to discover what "nudges" people to recycle. You were phenomenal! To witness the change of initial contamination rates for recycling to where we are now, was worth the work. For example, through central campus locations, contamination was nearly 45%. However, with the prompting of the posters, conversations about recycling and your support, our contamination has come down drastically. That – is deserving of recognition!

Second, let's recognize all of those who impacted our ISU experience this year. From those who maintained spaces (indoor and outdoor), to those providing nutritional, recreation, wellness and wellbeing resources and connections – and of course curricular and immersive career and professional development opportunities and support.

Finally, let's recognize things we can take with us over the Summer. Like the 4 Rs! Rethink...do you really need the newest one, or can you get by with something else? Reduce...choose renting, or borrowing, before purchasing. Reuse...opt for many uses instead of a single use. Finally, recycle...60-70% of our waste can be recycled, but is instead sent into underground storage through landfilling. Help your local landfill (and planet) and recycle before trashing!

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It's been an amazing year!

This is my last official column as Student Government Director of Sustainability.

What a year! This might be one of the most productive years of the Student Government Sustainability Committee yet.

Our projects included the purchase and installation of two new bike stations on campus, partnering with ISU Dining to create a pilot program for compostable cutlery at Hawthorn Drive and designing new ways to spread information on correct recycling practices that will be implemented next semester. We also approved Green Initiatives Fund applications from

projects. In total, we dispersed around \$28,000 from the Green Initiatives Fund.

Additionally, just last Friday, the Sustainability Committee hosted the 5th annual One Sustainable lowa Conference, drawing attendees representing 49 majors from 8 different lowa institutions. The day was an enormous success and helped students, faculty and staff from different institutions across lowa to network and share sustainability ideas between campuses. The day also featured an inspiring speech by the keynote speaker, Ben Jealous, executive director for the Sierra Club, on why we should remain hopeful for the future of the environmental movement and how to keep winning. Attendees were also treated to a delicious lunch, featuring local and sustainable ingredients.

It has been an honor serving as the Student Government Director of Sustainability this year. The Sustainability Committee accomplished so much, and I am so proud of our work this year.
