



Welcome to November – the month when America celebrates recycling! Here's what we are celebrating at ISU.

BOSS YOUR TOSS is the recycling campaign for the 2022-2023 school year. The focus of the campaign is to help students, faculty and staff understand they are the choice makers of where their waste goes - landfill or recycling.

BOSS YOUR TOSS is helping to educate the ISU community on what can and can not be put into single-stream recycling bins. Single-stream recycling means that all recyclable materials can go into one recycling bin. Items that can be single-stream recycled are paper, paper board (but not corrugated cardboard) metal bottles and cans, glass and "twist lid" and "tub" plastics.

As well as knowing what to throw, knowing how to throw is vital in successful recycling. Be mindful that poor choices can lead to damaging costs. If, for example, you choose to throw a half-sipped cup of coffee into recycling bin (causing coffee to spill onto everything), everything in the bin is considered "contaminated" and headed to the landfill instead of being recycled. Food-stained items are also considered contaminants - like a pizza box with oils on the box or stuck-on cheese remnants. So please NO FOOD, FOOD STAINS OR LIQUIDS IN THE RECYCLING BINS!

As well as a campaign, there is also a celebration! Join us - Tuesday, November 15

from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. on the South Library Lawn to learn more about BOSS YOUR TOSS, test your recycling skills and be a part of a "I BOSS MY TOSS" promotional rap video. At 11:30 a.m., star in the "Recycling Shuffle;" viral line dancing video. It's Steve, the "Recycling Guy", wishing you a successful end to the year and the semester! As we wrap up the 2022 calendar year, a couple of reminders. First - Check out the Recycling Services Newsletter winter edition, a great resource for all things recycling at lowa State. Second - Recycling (as you know) is about the "Three R's," Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. As we dive into the holiday season, I have a great Reuse opportunity to offer you, related to a long-held holiday tradition – greeting cards. Greeting cards were introduced in the late 1840's. The gift of a greeting card was a luxury, as cards (handcrafted of course) were expensive and often reserved for special occasions. In 1875 a German Printer by the name of Louise Prang started mass producing holiday cards... and a tradition was born.

With traditions come impact and the impact of greeting cards is what to do with them after "greeting" you. Choose reuse! It's easy at ISU. From December 15-January 15, Recycling Services and the Office of Sustainability are partnering to collect your greeting cards for reuse in the St. Jude's Ranch for Children's Recycled Card Program. Cards can be donated in two ways - drop them in collection boxes at the General Services Building (first floor, by the key/information desk) or send them in campus mail to Steve Kohtz (152 General Services Building) or Merry Rankin (108 General Services). A couple of reminders... ALL greeting cards (from any occasion) can be donated; only your card fronts are needed (please recycle the backs); cards from Disney, American Greetings and Hallmark are not able to be used by the program (please recycle the front and back).



In January, ISU was awarded a fourth consecutive gold certification, for collective commitment to and achievement in sustainability from the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education, Sustainability Tracking, Assessment & Rating System (AASHE STARS).

STARS is an international certification specifically targeting colleges and universities. Certification levels (bronze through platinum) are achieved through awarded points within seventeen areas of performance and 63 specific strategy areas, encompassing environmental, economic and social sustainability. Gathering and submitting information required for this three-year recertification takes nearly two years and involves experts and expertise from across campus, toward ensuring full representation of sustainability efforts, accomplishment and dedication. Our 2022 submission, as well as all of our previous gold certifications, can be viewed on the STARS website. Work toward continuous and persistent improvement is already underway for our 2026 submission. For now... Bask in the gold, Cyclones!

The consideration of persistent commitment is also woven throughout this month's <u>social media campaign</u> and issue of Live Green! Monthly. With a focus on collective impact, the February newsletter highlights and celebrates the dedication

and dedicated efforts required to achieve a sustainable future. recycling, unfortunately past years' gathering of information has revealed a good portion of our recycling is contaminated. Contamination happens when non-recyclables are put into the recycling bin. The biggest contamination challenge for us ... when food, liquid or food-stained items are found within the recycling bin. If contamination is prominent in the bin, sadly, all contents (including recyclables) are sent to the landfill.

Say NO to contamination!! Please make sure that your recycling is clean. If you have leftover food, PLEASE place it in a waste/trash bin or compost bin. If there is a swallow or more of liquid in your bottle, can or cup, PLEASE dump it out before you recycle. If your pizza box has oil stains on it, throw away the stained parts before recycling. The oil breaks down fibers, negatively impacting sturdiness capabilities for new paper products.

Remember - BOSS YOUR TOSS. Our success lies in all of us tossing correctly. Thank you for your help and commitment in ensuring a clean and "green" recycling stream.



Happy Spring Cyclones!

As we begin to look to the end of the Semester and plan our Spring Breaks let's consider the 5 R's to think about how we BOSS YOUR TOSS on and off-campus.

Although recycling is often thought of as a single act, it is actually third place (out of five) in the Zero Waste Network's waste hierarchy. To succeed in a journey toward minimal waste, steps one and two have to be a priority.

Step One: reduce. Consider your purchases - is it something you really need to buy, or could you borrow it from someone?

Step Two: reuse. Finding ways to reuse items, instead of throwing them away once their initial use is complete. GREAT EXAMPLE! I have an office mate who created an aquaponic garden in his basement from old plastic coffee cans and lids – and enjoys fresh salad all year!

Step Three: recycling (and composting). Still vital, but as a third option.

Step Four: recovery. Done by the Ames Resource Recovery Plant - combining processed burnable garbage with natural gas to provide electricity for the Ames community. This step offers a final option before landfilling (basically a storage repository), which is step five.

The challenge lies in our hands. Only we decide what happens to the waste that we produce. We can skip the first four steps and send everything to the landfill, or we can BOSS YOUR TOSS for an option that keeps items out of the landfill. As you have a waste decision - pause, remember and choose wisely your options: reduce, reuse, recycle, recovery or repository. Have a great spring break and stay the course - BOSS YOUR TOSS no matter where you are. Be safe, relax - and reduce, reuse, recycle!


