The Sustainability Committee has had plenty of updates in the past month!

First, the long-awaited bike stations were partially installed on February 8th. The one by the Memorial Union is currently functioning and you can go check it out on your next bike ride. The other station will be installed later in the semester in a location behind The Hub, following the completion of a construction project in the same area.

Happy March Cyclones!

It's hard to believe that in three short months we will be preparing for Summer. This year has seemed to fly by and be filled with many events, adventures and growth. For March, two updates to share.

First, in August, I began a research project about recycling signage evaluating the effectiveness of different signage information within sectors across campus. Five months in, In the study I have definitely noticed that the slight "nudges" provided by additional and descriptive signage has helped curb contamination in recycling bins – what causes recycling to become garbage. For example, when my project started, University Library recycling bins were contaminated about 68% of the time. And now... contamination has dropped to about 18%. Carver and Gilman Halls have also shown an impressive reduction. Thanks SO much for the great work. Seeing our grassroots efforts making a difference one recycling decision at a time is exciting. Stay tuned for more updates.

Second, I wanted to talk about the Campus Race to Zero Waste competition lowa State University is currently taking part in- along with over 1,000 universities across the United States and Canada. For this event, we report recycling and waste numbers with the goal of high recycling and low waste numbers. I am EXCITED to report that, so far, our recycling numbers are up from last year – and by a good percentage. Let's keep it going! Remember reduce, reuse and recycle BEFORE trashing! For more


